Diamond Ring Style Guide

17 POPULAR BAND STYLES AND SETTINGS



BAR SETTING

- Multiple diamonds set between vertical bars
- · Diamonds are visible on two sides plus top
- Can stand alone with no center stone



BEAD SETTING

- Related to pave setting
- Band is lined with small diamonds
- Multiple beads secure diamonds along the band



BEZEL SETTING

- Modern look, with center stone secured by metal rim
- · Rim can be partial setting, with sides open
- Snag-free for active lifestyles



CATHEDRAL SETTING

- Enhances prominence of center diamond
- · Center diamond is lifted higher off the finger
- Additional stones can be added to underside of center diamond
- The shoulders rise upwards toward the center diamond



CHANNEL SETTING

- Smaller diamonds are embedded in a channel on
- The smaller diamonds do not protrude beyond the channel
- Durable and fewer entanglements, beneficial for active lifestyles



CLUSTER SETTING

- Smaller stones snuggled together, like a floral arrangement
- · Clustering gives appearance of being a larger diamond
- Can also include a slightly larger center stone



FISHTAIL SETTING

- Offers a vintage feel
- Small diamonds line band
- V cutouts on band enhance sparkle and make diamonds look larger



- Diamond is set in a gap in band to be flush with band
- Unlikely to chip or fall out



- Suitable only for harder stones



HALO RING SETTING

- Smaller stones surround much larger center diamond
- Center stone appears larger than it really is
- Increased overall sparkle. especially coupled with pave band



KNIFE EDGE SETTING

- Band tapers to a sharp edge
- Sleek appearance
- · Style can be paired with other settings



PAVE SETTING

- Features smaller diamonds embedded in band
- · Spreads out the sparkle effect due to multiple angles
- · Resizing can be difficult



SIDESTONE SETTING

- Center diamond is flanked by multiple smaller diamonds
- · Complementary diamonds add to overall sparkle
- · Three-stone setting with two sapphires is one variety



SOLITAIRE SETTING

- Most classic setting, with simple elegance
- Center diamond gets "stage"
- Prong setting facilitates maximum sparkle
- Thinner band option makes diamond appear larger



SPLIT SETTING

- Band splits near center
- diamond, forming a V Can complement several stone
- shapes, sizes
- · Split portion is versatile; can twist or be adorned with smaller stones



TENSION SETTING

- Modern look; no prongs, so nearly full diamond is visible
- Tension and miniscule grooves hold diamond in place
- · Visibility makes shape and cut more crucial
- Difficult to resize



TWIST SETTING

- Two twisting strands form the band
- · Twists can be tight or wide
- Increasingly popular in some locations



VINTAGE SETTING

- Band features intricate detail work
- Styles can fit specific time periods
- · Can be paired with other settings' features
